Feature Films about this period of history and/or subjects discussed in exhibits

Separate but Equal, 1991 TV Film with Sidney Poitier and Burt Lancaster, which is a two-part miniseries with the first half devoted to the actual case in South Carolina, in which a progressive African-American reverend and school principal encourages one family to bring a case against the school board. The principal does not understand the fine points of the law, only that the black schools receive less funding than schools with white children. Although this film takes place in the 1950's and not 1914-1919, it illustrates segregation and the Jim Crow Laws.
